Workshop A: Big Lottery Fund Kemar Walford (Big Lottery Fund)	Great Hall
Big Lottery Fund is an outcomes funder and is driven by the difference its funding makes for individuals and communities. Since June 2004, we have awarded over £8 billion to projects supporting health, education, environment and other charitable purposes, from early years intervention to commemorative travel funding for World War Two veterans.

In our "Friends With Money" session, we will examine how social media can help your organization identify prospects, turn them into regular donors, and the larger role social media plays beyond online donations. We will outline a fundraising checklist for your social media activity, and provide examples (that aren't the Ice Bucket Challenge!) of where charities and organisations have harnessed the power of social media in their fundraising in an engaging and impactful way.
