	The chair fed back to the room that there was a common thread on all the	
	issues brought forward. The expanding complexity of the needs and services	
	offered.	
	Older people have more needs and the complexity of these needs are	
	increasing. This in turns means they need more support but the services are	
	numerous, short term, diverse (from small to large providers across different	
	sectors) and there is no single point of access. This means providers and	
	commissioners need to be better equipped and informed to be able to	
	deliver and refer to each other.
