#### WHAT IS CHEMSEX?

Definition according to The New Statesman, May 2016:

'chemsex refers to gay or bisexual men using drugs to facilitate sex with other men. It has become a catch-all term for sex involving drugs and "chemsex parties'

'It's important to note that chemsex is distinct from drug use which later leads to sexual activity: chemsex is where men take a certain drug or drugs because they are about to have sex.'

Chemsex is a relatively recent phenomenon – rise of this pattern of drug use seen in urban centres over the past 10 years.

Specifically a set of drugs used to enhance sexual sensation and performance at parties with groups of MSM.

MSM, technology and drugs as 'The Perfect Storm'



#### THE DRUGS USED IN CHEMSEX

**Crystal methamphetamine** – smoked, sniffed or IV (slamming)

Mephodrone – oral, rectal, IV or sniffed

**GBL** – oral, occasionally injected.

Other substances used

MDMA - oral or IV

Cocaine - sniffed or IV

Xanax/alcohol - oral

Cannabis - smoked

**Ketamine** – IV, oral or sniffed



#### **CHEMSEX RISKS**

**Crystal methamphetamine:** dehydration, insomnia, malnutrition, psychosis, cardiac problems.

**GBL:** addictive++; steep dose curve; acute OD danger alone and even more so if mixed with other sedatives; unpredictable, rapid onset withdrawal phenomena including risk of rhabdomyolysis.

IV drug use: sharing behaviour, injecting others and concomitant legal issues, increased rates of HIV, Hep B and Hep C.

**Sexual health:** decreased sober sex, increased risk of other STI's, bare-backing, physical injury, consent issues, disinhibition, increased risk of HIV meds non-compliance.

**Social Functioning:** loss of other relationships, jobs, tenancies, bullying, rejection, pressure to continue when no longer fun.

Mental Health: comedown, suicidality, psychosis, self harm, anxiety, trauma.

CLUB DRUG CLINIC

CNWL Mental Health Trust, situated in Earls Court.

Commissioned to see atypical drug users and drug use: a different demographic requiring a different model from mainstream drug treatment services.

Triborough catchment area: Westminster, Hammersmith & Fulham, Kensington & Chelsea.

Team comprises specialist nurses, a mindfulness practitioner, drug workers, psychologists, psycho-sexual counsellor, family therapist and couples counsellor, and consultant psychiatrist.

Service users fall into 3 broad categories: psychonauts; chemsexers and ATOM-isers.

#### **ASSESSMENT**

Comprehensive assessment:

Drug taking/substance use history

Social history

Risk assessment

Psychiatric assessment

Physical health assessment

Treatment goals

Care planning

Consent



#### **TREATMENT**

Person centred talking therapy.

MI & CBT.

Psycho-sexual counselling.

Couples counselling.

Family therapy.

Preparation for and referral to inpatient detox.

Referral to and co-working with care management teams for rehab and aftercare.

Referral onto other specialisms: eg. Urology, CMHT, ETE.

Harm reduction.

Moderation/reduction/controlled use.

Hep B testing & vaccination.

Mental health treatment.

ADHD assessment and treatment initiation.

Mindfulness 1:1 and in groups.



# THE CLUB DRUG CLINIC@CHELWEST SEXUAL HEALTH SERVICES

Initially a pilot project.

Has been running for 3 years.

2 sites: John Hunter Clinic - Friday afternoons

10 Hammersmith Broadway - Monday evenings.

3 booked appointments for each clinic.

Specialist advice for colleagues.



#### STATISTICS FROM JANUARY TO DECEMBER 2018:

94 clients seen for assessment.

95% of whom were male

79% of whom were MSM

62% of whom were HIV+ve

7% of whom had no history of other STI's.

34% HIV+ve & syphilis, gonorrhoea and chlamydia

48% of those assessed were using Crystal meth and GBL in combination.

83% using G recreationally; 17% dependently.

60% of crystal meth use was IV.
