Numeracy & Literacy

Numeracy and Literacy - lit-num@clementjames.org

- 10 weekly 1:1 sessions with one of our tutors to support a student with either Maths or English
- Supporting young people who are working below expected levels in maths or English, with the aim of helping them to build foundational skills & progress in their core subjects and beyond
- We work with Y3 up to Y11 students
- Prioritise students facing additional barriers to accessing education

IntoUniversity is an educational organisation that supports young people to **explore their future options** and to **develop skills and knowledge to achieve their goals**. We do this in a number of ways...



Children & Young People's Education

Primary and Secondary FOCUS workshops with Years 3-13 in local Schools

Academic Support and mentoring after school



Trips to universities and corporate partners as well as exclusive work experience opportunities

Holiday programmes focusing on different careers or university subjects



Academic Support

- Monday, Tuesday, Thursday = Primary AS
3:30pm - 5pm
- Monday, Wednesday, Friday = Secondary AS
4pm-5:30pm
Friday: 3:45pm - 5:15pm.

Primary

- Homework support
OR
- Students take part in a maths/english lesson in the form of a degree topic e.g. they will learn about computer science but this will be made up of maths/English questions in line with the National Curriculum

Secondary

- Homework support
OR
- Students complete independent projects called Future Readiness. This is designed to encourage a love of learning and develop their metacognition skills (the ability to work something out independently.)



Mentoring

We also run 2 different mentoring schemes that involve students meeting up with a volunteer to work on their goals.

University Student Mentoring

- Secondary Academic Support students meet up with a volunteer student from a university to work on their social, future or academic goals.
- Pairs should meet on average once a fortnight.

Corporate Mentoring

- Students in Year 13 meet up with a professional mentor to work on their career aspirations, academic goals and getting them ready for university.
- Pairs meet around once a month throughout year 13 and the first term of university.

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Early Intervention for Children and Young People

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Children & Young People's Advocacy for School Exclusions

Overview of the Programme

- The programme is providing specialist education-based advice and advocacy for children and families in North Kensington.
- Funded through the RBKC North Kensington Inclusion Programme, this service is being delivered by ClementJames and Coram
- Created to provide an independent space where families and young people can feel supported, have a understanding of their rights and the school exclusion process

Children & Young People's Advocacy

Who is the advocacy service available to?

- Children/young people and their family
- Working with children in Key Stage 1 - Key Stage 4
- North Kensington residents or young people attending a school in North Kensington
- There will be a priority given to the most urgent cases

CYP criteria for the advocacy service;

- Being permanently excluded or manage moved
- Experiencing suspensions/ fixed-term exclusions
- At a high risk of exclusion (for example, due to a high number of behaviour points or lots of internal exclusions)

Children & Young People's Advocacy

What does support look like?

Tailored support to meet the young person and family needs

- Providing information around permanent exclusions, managed moves, SEN rights, legal obligation for exclusions
- Meeting 1-2-1 with the guardian and/or young person to discuss the case, their emotional & learning needs and ensure their voice is heard throughout the process
- Attend meetings with the school and key professionals
- Support in writing emails to school and other relevant professionals
- Attend and support with appeals if necessary
- Attend visits to alternative provisions or recommended mainstream schools
- Case consultations with Coram's legal and therapeutic professionals

Children & Young People's Advocacy

How to refer a young person to the advocacy service?

- Anyone can refer to the service (e.g. schools, professionals, parents)
- If you are uncertain if the young person would be suitable for a referral, please email or call to discuss (cypadvocacy@clementjames.org or 0207 221 8810)
- Please gain **permission** from guardian before completing a referral form
- Referral form (this can be filled out by a parent/guardian or someone who is working with the young person)

Young People's Project Worker

Aims to increase positive outcomes for young people in relation to their educational and career based goals. The Programme has a particular focus on supporting young people at risk of exclusion or in alternative provision settings.

We provide one to one and group workshops with some key aims of interventions listed below; sessions and provision can be adapted to each partner's needs.

- To boost understanding of post 16 options
- Increase knowledge of future career pathways
- Increase confidence in applying to future opportunities
- Work with schools to ensure young people leaving year 11 at 16 have secured options in their chosen areas
- Offer and provide follow up support to 16+ at ClementJames if needed through relationships built at schools

What services we currently offer

- Female Mentoring for students who are struggling with confidence and self-esteem, or at risk of exclusion - this is currently offered at KAA and Latimer, with hopes to expand.
- Young Achievers Programme - which is focused on year 6 students who are transitioning to secondary school. YAP is currently happening at St Francis of Assisi
- Westside Alternative Provision - Career workshops and 1-2-1 sessions to let the students know post-16 options
- Employment Support - for clients who are NEET and between the ages of 16-24 who need help getting back into work, education or training
