Employment and Skills support as part of Grenfell Recovery





THE ROYAL BOROUGH OF KENSINGTON AND CHELSEA Within the Grenfell Recovery Strategy there is a commitment to support the employment and skills ambitions of residents, outlined by two key action points:

• Work with the community to agree area of focus for the project, taking into account consultation to date, the targeted Grenfell focus, and the needs of residents

• Design and deliver a community-based commissioning project in this area

To help meet this commitment, a project was developed under the working title **Community Works** in late 2019.

This project has focused on working with residents, in workshops and small groups over several sessions, and with local partners to identify what support is needed and to develop ideas into potential projects to meet those needs.

Residents told us what was needed in their own words:

How were the project ideas developed?

What we've done

1. Initial Project Scoping

Working with agencies and partners, the first stage was to identify the scope for this programme which was developed into the following points:

- For people who have been affected by the Grenfell tragedy who are unemployed or in insecure employment and want to work
- To change how we work to materially support people to identify and achieve their long-term aspirations and goals
- We will keep communities at the centre of this work and the project will be community-led
- We acknowledge that we need to build trust and ensure there is regular sharing and feedback with the community
- The outcome of this project will be increased levels of good employment for people affected by the Grenfell tragedy
- We will keep in mind the principle of 'Peer Support' to focus on the person and their support networks

2. Gathering evidence of needs

We have gathered evidence from people who we hope will benefit from these services – parents with young families; people who are vulnerable or who have special needs; and people who have been out of work for a long time. They told us what would make the difference for them

3. Developing ideas together

In workshops and follow-up meetings, hundreds of ideas and suggestions were grouped into common themes. These were examined and those that received more mentions and endorsements have been summarised into potential projects.

The potential projects listed indicate the needs each project addresses and how much the project would probably cost, either for a two-year period or for a programme as described. We now need to decide which projects to take forward with the funding from the Grenfell Recovery Strategy. There is £250,000 currently available for this work and there may be opportunities to align or access other funds which will be explored.

4.COVID-19 impact

This has slowed the progress in developing the projects through cocreation. The impact upon the economy and residents' employment prospects means there is a greater need for support. The ideas developed under Community Works will be fed into COVID-19 recovery planning and considered for implementation across the borough to assist residents needing assistance as the recovery from the pandemic develops.
