

Grenfell Tower Inquiry

The Government has set up an Inquiry into the fire at Grenfell Tower.

It aims to find out what happened in the fire and ensure steps are taken to prevent such a tragedy happening again.

The Inquiry will be independent. It will be for the Inquiry Chair to decide what questions it can ask, what evidence it can see, or who it can call as a witness.

Survivors and residents of the Lancaster West Estate will be involved throughout the Inquiry process. They will be invited to hire lawyers to represent them and the Inquiry will pay for these lawyers.

The Inquiry will be chaired by Sir Martin Moore-Bick, a very experienced retired judge. He will be completely separate from the Government, which will have no control over him or the Inquiry.

The Inquiry is separate from the police

The Inquiry is separate from the police investigation into the fire. The police are investigating whether anyone has committed a crime and should be put on trial in court. The Inquiry aims to find out what happened so steps can be taken to stop such a tragedy happening again.

The Inquiry is separate from the Inquests

The Inquiry is also separate from the Inquests into the deaths of people who died in the fire. Inquests will be held by the Coroner and are held whenever someone dies unexpectedly or in unexplained circumstances.

What should the Inquiry cover? Your chance to make suggestions

The Inquiry Chair, Sir Martin Moore-Bick, is now seeking views from residents in the area and other people affected by the fire on the questions the Inquiry should ask.

You can comment on any part of the Inquiry but we are especially interested in the following questions:

- What do you think the Inquiry should cover?
- Is there any type of evidence you think the Inquiry must obtain?
- The Inquiry plans to publish a first report on the most important issues around the fire, as soon as possible. It will then publish a second report on other issues some time later. What should the Inquiry deal with in its first report? What should be left for the main report, so the first report can be published quickly?
- Would you like to be kept informed of the Inquiry's work? How would you like to be contacted?
