



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

NOTTING HILL SUMMER PROJECT

29th JULY -26th AUGUST



- Inspired by SNCC's voter registration project in Mississippi
- · Main aim was to compile a register of housing conditions
- · Also wanted to dispel racist myths around council housing

THE COMMUNITY WORKSHOP

The Workshop's aim is to help people build a community organisation in an area of poverty and deprivation. Most of the area's social needs stem from housing; a great number of the population are coloured. Problems of housing and race are linked.

"Racial prejudice," says Mr. Clark, "is deeply ingrained: we feel that the reasons are largely social and largely economic. The main reason for prejudice is often that people are afraid that somebody is going to get in front of them, to jump the queue.

So many black people think the English are hypocrites for refusing to admit the extent of racial discrimination — and the English think every black man has a chip on his shoulder when he complains he is being discriminated against, but can't prove it with facts and figures.

And when both sides are living in appalling housing conditions, these are the sort of attitudes that stop understanding let alone any kind of real

integration.
