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IN YOUR WARD

Kensington and Chelsea is a borough of startling contrasts where extremes of affluence and deprivation sit side by side. Find the data for your local ward and see how it compares to others.

1 ABINGDON	
Population:	9,600 (K&C density rank = 7th)
Wellbeing rank:	London = 47th, K&C = 6th
Deprivation rank:	London = 495th, K&C = 11th
Child poverty rate:	18%
Risk of fuel poverty:	Low
Local election turnout:	2006 = 25.7% ▲ 23% 2010 = 48.8%

Key fact: Cllrs James Husband and Joanna Gardner have both been mayors of Kensington and Chelsea in the last five years. Cllr Victoria Borwick is currently the Deputy Mayor.

2 BROMPTON	
Population:	9,500 (K&C density rank = 17th)
Wellbeing rank:	London = 12th, K&C = 2nd
Deprivation rank:	London = 449th, K&C = 11th
Child poverty rate:	13%
Risk of fuel poverty:	Low
Local election turnout:	2006 = 23.8% ▲ 16% 2010 = 39.9%

Key fact: Brompton has the borough's lowest rate of JSA claimants at just 1.5%

3 CAMPDEN	
Population:	8,700 (K&C density rank = 16th)
Wellbeing rank:	London = 8th, K&C = 1st
Deprivation rank:	London = 509th, K&C = 17th
Child poverty rate:	7%
Risk of fuel poverty:	Very low
Local election turnout:	2006 = 31.4% ▲ 17% 2010 = 48.1%

Key fact: Campden has the highest rate of self-reported wellbeing in the borough and the eighth highest across London.

5 COURTFIELD	
Population:	10,000 (K&C density rank = 2nd)
Wellbeing rank:	London = 33rd, K&C = 3rd
Deprivation rank:	London = 476th, K&C = 15th
Child poverty rate:	5%
Risk of fuel poverty:	Very low
Local election turnout:	2006 = 23.7% ▲ 14% 2010 = 37.5%

Key fact: In both 2006 and 2010 Courtfield reported the lowest turnout in the local elections across the borough.

8 GOLBORNE	
Population:	10,300 (K&C density rank = 14th)
Wellbeing rank:	London = 564th, K&C = 18th
Deprivation rank:	London = 8th, K&C = 1st
Child poverty rate:	51%
Risk of fuel poverty:	Very high
Local election turnout:	2006 = 29.7% ▲ 21% 2010 = 50.6%

Key fact: Child poverty in Golborne stands at 51%, the highest in the borough. It also ranks first for fuel poverty.

4 COLVILLE	
Population:	8,200 (K&C density rank = 1st)
Wellbeing rank:	London = 394th, K&C = 15th
Deprivation rank:	London = 131st, K&C = 4th
Child poverty rate:	34%
Risk of fuel poverty:	High
Local election turnout:	2006 = 31.9% ▲ 23% 2010 = 54.7%

Key fact: Colville is the most densely populated ward in Kensington and Chelsea.

6 CREMORNE	
Population:	9,650 (K&C density rank = 6th)
Wellbeing rank:	London = 190th, K&C = 14th
Deprivation rank:	London = 239th, K&C = 5th
Child poverty rate:	37%
Risk of fuel poverty:	Average
Local election turnout:	2006 = 35.5% ▲ 16% 2010 = 51.7%

Key fact: Cremorne is ranked joint 2nd with Courtfield for the highest rate of privately rented accommodation in the borough.

7 EARL'S COURT	
Population:	10,000 (K&C density rank = 3rd)
Wellbeing rank:	London = 150th, K&C = 12th
Deprivation rank:	London = 240th, K&C = 6th
Child poverty rate:	25%
Risk of fuel poverty:	Average
Local election turnout:	2006 = 25.1% ▲ 17% 2010 = 41.8%

Key fact: In 2011, Earl's Court had the third highest rate of ambulance call outs in the borough for alcohol-related illness.

9 HANS TOWN	
Population:	9,500 (K&C density rank = 8th)
Wellbeing rank:	London = 37th, K&C = 4th
Deprivation rank:	London = 467th, K&C = 13th
Child poverty rate:	22%
Risk of fuel poverty:	Low
Local election turnout:	2006 = 27% ▲ 13% 2010 = 40.1%

Key fact: Hans Town has the highest life expectancy and the most over 65s in the borough. Between 2005 and 2009, the average male life expectancy was 98 yrs.

10 HOLLAND	
Population:	9,750 (K&C density rank = 15th)
Wellbeing rank:	London = 54th, K&C = 7th
Deprivation rank:	London = 435th, K&C = 10th
Child poverty rate:	20%
Risk of fuel poverty:	Low
Local election turnout:	2006 = 27.4% ▲ 22% 2010 = 49.6%

Key fact: Holland pupils performed best at GCSE and equivalent Key Stage 4 exams in 2011 across the borough's maintained schools.

11 NORLAND	
Population:	9,150 (K&C density rank = 11th)
Wellbeing rank:	London = 153rd, K&C = 13th
Deprivation rank:	London = 326th, K&C = 7th
Child poverty rate:	25%
Risk of fuel poverty:	Average
Local election turnout:	2006 = 32.8% ▲ 22% 2010 = 55%

Key fact: House prices in Norland were higher than anywhere else in the borough in the first half of 2012. The average house price was over £3 million.

13 PEMBRIDGE	
Population:	8,450 (K&C density rank = 4th)
Wellbeing rank:	London = 59th, K&C = 8th
Deprivation rank:	London = 397th, K&C = 9th
Child poverty rate:	14%
Risk of fuel poverty:	Low
Local election turnout:	2006 = 29.3% ▲ 19% 2010 = 48.6%

Key fact: Pembridge has the highest number of 16-64 year old work registered adults, who are overseas nationals.

15 REDCLIFFE	
Population:	8,950 (K&C density rank = 12th)
Wellbeing rank:	London = 63rd, K&C = 9th
Deprivation rank:	London = 386th, K&C = 8th
Child poverty rate:	13%
Risk of fuel poverty:	Low
Local election turnout:	2006 = 25% ▲ 19% 2010 = 43.7%

Key fact: Only 12% of Redcliffe homes are social housing. This is the second lowest rate in the borough.

12 NOTTING BARN	
Population:	9,300 (K&C density rank = 9th)
Wellbeing rank:	London = 413th, K&C = 6th
Deprivation rank:	London = 64th, K&C = 3rd
Child poverty rate:	41%
Risk of fuel poverty:	High
Local election turnout:	2006 = 34% ▲ 21% 2010 = 55.2%

Key fact: Notting Barns had the highest local election turnout in 2010.

14 QUEEN'S GATE	
Population:	9,900 (K&C density rank = 5th)
Wellbeing rank:	London = 67th, K&C = 10th
Deprivation rank:	London = 526th, K&C = 18th
Child poverty rate:	4%
Risk of fuel poverty:	Very low
Local election turnout:	2006 = 24.6% ▲ 16% 2010 = 41%

Key fact: Queen's Gate has the lowest levels of deprivation in the borough. It also has the lowest rate of child poverty at only 4%.

16 ROYAL HOSPITAL	
Population:	7,900 (K&C density rank = 18th)
Wellbeing rank:	London = 46th, K&C = 5th
Deprivation rank:	London = 482nd, K&C = 16th
Child poverty rate:	9%
Risk of fuel poverty:	Low
Local election turnout:	2006 = 31.9% ▲ 18% 2010 = 50.3%

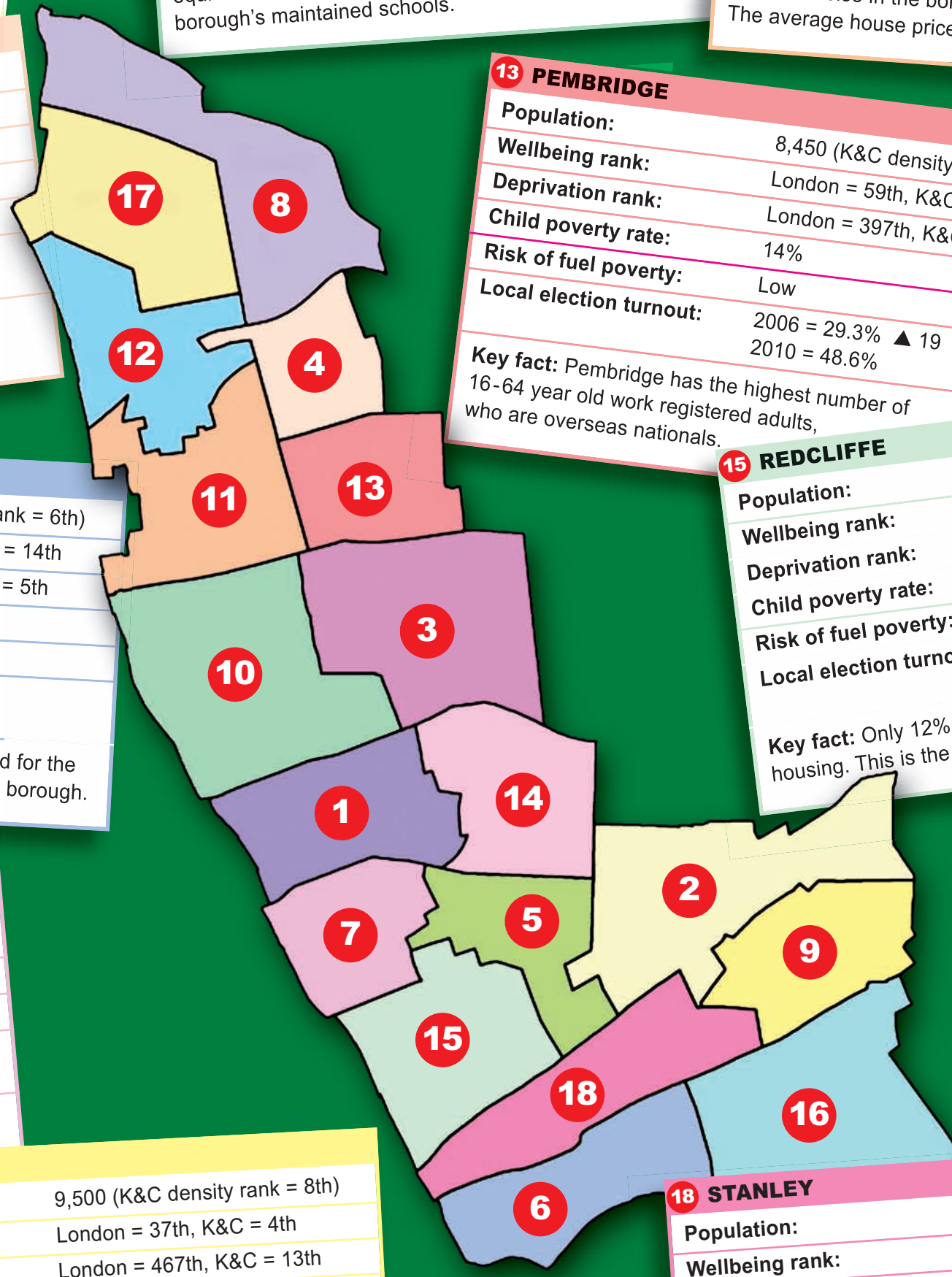
Key fact: Royal Hospital has the lowest population density in the borough. It has the third lowest rate of child poverty at 9%.

17 ST CHARLES	
Population:	9,200 (K&C density rank = 10th)
Wellbeing rank:	London = 519th, K&C = 17th
Deprivation rank:	London = 62nd, K&C = 2nd
Child poverty rate:	43%
Risk of fuel poverty:	Very high
Local election turnout:	2006 = 34.6% ▲ 18% 2010 = 52.7%

Key fact: In 2009 St Charles had the highest number of adults with mental illness in receipt of incapacity benefits.

18 STANLEY	
Population:	8,100 (K&C density rank = 13th)
Wellbeing rank:	London = 81st, K&C = 11th
Deprivation rank:	London = 473rd, K&C = 14th
Child poverty rate:	16%
Risk of fuel poverty:	Low
Local election turnout:	2006 = 30.2% ▲ 19% 2010 = 49.1%

Key fact: Stanley has the highest rate of home ownership in the borough at 57%.



Rankings: London out of 625 wards, K&C out of 18 wards.
Population: Round ward level projections for 2011.
Wellbeing rank: Based on 12 different indicators. Information collated by the GLA.

Deprivation rank: Based on 7 distinct dimensions incorporating 37 separate indicators. From the Indices of Deprivation 2010.
Child poverty rate: Figures for 2011 published by the Campaign to End Child Poverty.

Fuel Poverty: Based on GLA fuel poverty scores for 2010.
Local election turnout: The 2010 local elections were held on the same day as the General Election which may account for the increased turnout.
